## Resurrection Rolls

Third- and fourth-grade students ate Resurrection Rolls recently. The rolls represented Jesus' tomb, marshmallows represented Jesus and the cinnamon and sugar represented the spices that Jesus' body was rubbed with before his burial. Directions and ingredients needed are as follows.

### Ingredients

- 1 package crescent rolls
- melted butter
- large marshmallows
- cinnamon sugar

### Directions

1. Ask an adult to set the oven at 350 degrees.
2. Take a large marshmallow and dip it into melted butter.
3. Roll the marshmallow in cinnamon and sugar.
4. Place a crescent roll triangle flat. Wrap the marshmallow in it. Tightly seal the edges.
5. Ask an adult to place the treats in the oven. They will bake for 10-12 minutes.
6. Let the treats cool. When you bite into them, the center will be empty, just like Jesus' tomb was empty on that first Easter.
7. Eat your treat.

The shape, because you can pick up the fallen sheep.

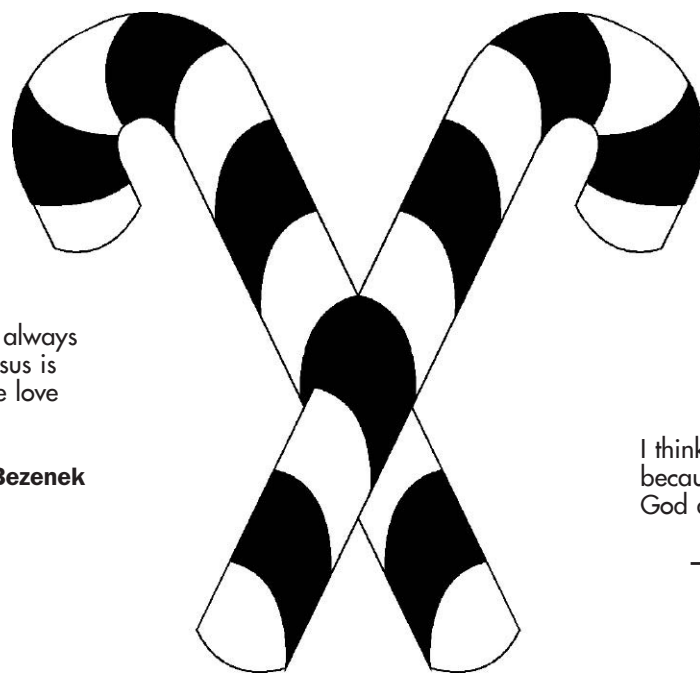
